










May — Excelencia disseminates "Modeling Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs):

Students." This brief summarizes institutional practices from 12 top ranked HSIs working to improve student access, retention, and the academic achievement of their students overall and Latino students in particular.



September — Excelencia presents a brief and convening, "ALASS: Accelerating Latino Student Success at Texas Border Institutions." 









April — Excelencia launches a national data strategy and series of policy forums,
Ensuring America's Future. Among the work produced is "The Roadmap for Ensuring America's Future" and the first analysis of Latino college completion by states.








January — Excelencia kicks off the year by releasing "The Condition of Latinos in Education: 2015 Factbook" which includes nine important briefs in the first month covering the spectrum of Hispanic students and professionals: "Latinos in Early Childhood Education;" "Latinos in K-12 Education;" Latinos in Higher Education;" "Latinos in the Workforce;" "Top 25 Institutions Graduating Latinos in All Disciplines;" "Parental Involvement in Education & Latinos in STEM;" "Latinos in Higher Educations: National Snapshot;" "HSI Profiles: 2012-13."




July — The rate of college-going Hispanics sees large, unprecedented, documented growth. A U.S. Census report shows that in 2015, almost 40% of Hispanics ages 25 and older have some college experience. That is up from 30% in 2000. By this year, 52% of U.S.-born Hispanics have attended college, an increase from 41% in 2000. That upward growth trend continues for Latinos today.






May — Excelencia issues "From Selectivity to Success: Latinos at Selective Institutions," which underscores what selective institutions can and should be doing to better serve Latino students.



The same month, *Excelencia* unveils the brief, "From Capacity to Success: HSIs, Title V, and Latino Students." It provides a snapshot of Latinos in postsecondary education, as well as a summary of the growth and current profile of HSIs. The report proves to be landmark analysis and extremely salient to policymakers at the state and national level. *Excelencia's* Capitol Hill briefings with congressional staff, federal agencies, and Latino advocacy organizations bring more national attention to the the role of HSIs and their potential for serving Latino student success.






July — Knowing the data about the growth of the Latino community in the South, Excelencia partners with the Appalachian College Association to analyze institutional capacities and needs to in the co-published report, "The ARC (Access, Retention, and Completion) of Success for Latino Students in Appalachia: A Summary Profile."



December — Three more significant works are released in 2017: "Latino Males:

Mentoring for the Future," "What Works for Latino Students in Higher Education," and "Framing, Not Blaming: Improving College Transfer in Texas." The three showcase Excelencia's expertise to address multiple topics and produce necessary needs analysis to advance policy recommendations to positively impact Latino student achievement.

For the U.S. to regain the top ranking in the world for college degree attainment, Latinos will need to earn 6.1 million more degrees by 2020.

To reach the degree attainment goal by 2020, the U.S. can: I) close the equity gap in college completion: 2) increase the number of degrees that work for tracking Latino and other students. The following is a framework for tracking Latino degree attainment in the United States, 25% of the K-12 population was Latino.






October — Over 60 leaders of higher education and Latino advocacy organizations endorse The Seal of Excelencia framework, a new, data driven approach created by Excelencia aimed at significantly increasing

the number of Latino students attaining college degrees by 2030. **The Seal of** *Excelencia* is the first-ever certification for colleges and universities to earn based on their effectiveness in intentionally serving Latino students.

More than 300 friends and allies join the Excelencia team for a joyous celebration of impact and commitment to accelerating Latino student success in higher education.



June — Excelencia continues
advancing the national agenda for
Latinos in higher education by
announcing the inaugural cohort of
nine colleges and universities certified
with the Seal of Excelencia. To earn
the Seal, institutions demonstrate
intentionality and impact in three core

areas of work that *Excelencia* has determined lead to Latino student success: data, practice, and leadership. This certification establishes and raises the bar by which institutions are evaluated and confirmed to intentionally serve Latino students.

July — Excelencia's Presidents for
Latino Student Success network
grows from its original 23 committed
leaders in 2014 to over 100 presidents
and chancellors in less than five years.



August — Since its inception *Excelencia* has viewed **Puerto Rico** and its system of higher education, as important to U.S. Latino student success. Despite the hardships Puerto Ricans have faced since devasting Hurricane Maria struck in 2017, higher education remains a priority to the island's economy and future. *Excelencia's* co-founders go to the island to meet with higher education officials, and return with agreements from four chancellors to affiliate with *Excelencia's* network and develop joint efforts in the future.

December — The co-founders conclude a busy year of traveling to 20 states and territories, where they delivered over 40 speeches and met with public and private officials to promote, instill, and implement Latino student success strategies across the country.









April – Excelencia holds a virtual webinar, "National Briefing on 25 Years of Hispanic-Serving Institutions" to review the impact of HSIs and the pivotal role of the Seal of Excelencia-certified institutions. Almost 1,000 people attend the national event.





May — Excelencia releases its research brief, "Higher Education in Puerto Rico: Conditions and Context Influencing Institutional Resilience." Excelencia shows the issues in Puerto Rico are also a bellwether of what mainland institutions may need to address to more intentionally serve Latino and rural learners.

June — Excelencia receives a multimillion-dollar gift from Philanthropist MacKenzie Scott, the largest in the organization's 17-year history. And 13 of the 29 institutions that also received gifts are part of Excelencia's Presidents for Latino Student Success network.



April — Excelencia's role as a change agent continues to grow as its portfolio. *Excelencia* expands technical assistance for cohorts to self-assess with a Latino lens using our **Seal Serving Institutional Transformation Assessment (SSITA)** for those starting their journey to more intentionally serve Latino, and all, students. In total, 66 institutions participated in TA.




July — As the nation's economic recovery continues, Excelencia's latest analysis, "Beyond Completion: **Post-completion Efforts** at Hispanic-Serving **Institutions,"** reveals institutions intentionally focused on serving their

learning experiences that promote workforce preparation and career success.

Summer — *Excelencia* receives its first grants from Bank of America Foundation and JP Morgan Chase Foundation, establishing a pathway for corporate leaders to make common cause with Excelencia and institutions intentionally serving Latino, and all, students.

September — *Excelencia* offers **Seal** of Excelencia recertification for the first time and nine institutions are recertified, proving the Seal's ongoing value as an institutional self-assessment tool transforming higher education. Six other institutions earn the Seal for the first time. The evolution of the Seal transforming higher education is in full effect now.





February — The brief, "Institutional Resilience in **Puerto Rico: A First Look at Efforts by Puerto Rican** HSIs," is the 2nd study of efforts on the island to serve Latino students in challenging situations, such as the effects of hurricanes, earthquakes, fiscal austerity, governance changes, demographic shifts, and the COVID-19 pandemic.

September — The role of the **Seal of** *Excelencia* in transforming higher education continues to grow. Seal-certified colleges and universities (39) represent less than 1% of all institutions but enroll over 15% and graduate 17% of all Latino graduates. In partnership with Excelencia, they advance the Latino talent needed for the country's future workforce and economy.





October — Excelencia demonstrates convening effectiveness by creating "The Meeting Place for **Professional Setting the National Agenda for Latino** Student Success in Higher Education," and a National Policy Forum in Washington, D.C.

November - Excelencia's network of presidents and chancellors makes a significant collective impact on Latino student success nationally. Over 190 presidents and chancellors affiliated with **Presidents for Latino** Students Success and are transforming to become colleges where Latino students thrive.





January 2024 — Excelencia marks 20 years of service to our country by re-releasing its first publication from 2004, "Latino Students Success at Hispanic-Serving Institutions: Findings from a Demonstration Project." The seminal brief addresses how an institution "serves" students and recognizes the through-line from this study to Excelencia's powerful portfolio, tactical plan, and proven impact.



In 2024 over 200 college and university presidents and chancellors choose to enroll the **Presidents for Latino** Student Success (P4LSS) national network. Excelencia supports and catalyzes their efforts to intentionally serve Latino, and all, students.

September - With the Seal of Excelencia, Excelencia has asserted national leadership for institutional transformation to intentionally serve Latino and all students. Fall 2024, 47 institutions from the P4LSS network had earned the Seal of Excelencia.



Excelencia hosts a 20th Anniversary Cena a special evening of conversation, culture, and a shared commitment to advancing Latino student success.





Focused on greater impact, Excelencia launches the Excelencia Futuro Fund, a concerted campaign to raise a \$1million to advance the Seal of *Excelencia* and intentionally serving Latino, and all, students.
