


Latino Undergraduate Enrollment

• Latinos were the second largest group enrolled in higher education. In 2014-15, Latinos represented 17% of all undergraduate students, compared to Whites (53%), African Americans (12%), Asians (6%), and other racial/ethnic groups (12%).¹

Pell Grant Recipients²

- Latinos were the third largest group among Pell Grant recipients. In 2011-12, Latinos represented 19% of all Pell Grant recipients, compared to Whites (47%), African Americans (24%), Asian/Pacific Islanders (5%), American Indians (1%), and students of other racial/ethnic groups (3%).^{3,4}
- Half of all Latino undergraduates received a Pell Grant. In 2011-12, 50% of Latino undergraduates received a Pell Grant, compared to 62% of African American, 54% of American Indian, 34% of Asian/Pacific Islander, and 34% of White undergraduates.⁵

- Latinos received a slightly larger average Pell Grant than most groups. In 2011-12, the average Pell Grant awarded to Latinos was \$3,500, compared to \$3,300 for Whites, \$3,400 for African Americans, \$3,400 for American Indians, and \$3,800 for Asian/Pacific Islanders.⁶
- Pell Grants covered a small portion of Latinos' total cost of attendance. In 2011-12, the average Pell Grant for Latinos covered about 20% of total cost of attendance. The average Pell Grant award for Latinos was \$3,500 and the average total price of attendance among Latino Pell Grant recipients was \$17,200.⁷

Pell Grants & Other Aid

- Fewer Latino Pell Grant recipients had student loans compared to others. In 2011-12, 50% of all Latinos receiving Pell Grants had student loans, compared to 66% of African Americans, 65% of Whites, 60% of American Indians, and 52% of Asian/Pacific Islanders.⁸
- Latino Pell Grant recipients were less likely than some groups to also receive a state grant. In 2011-12, Latino Pell Grant recipients were less likely to also received a state grant (24%) than Asian/Pacific Islanders (37%) and Whites (26%), but more likely to receive a state grant than African Americans and American Indians (23% each).⁹
- Latino Pell Grant recipients were the second largest group to also receive institutional grants. In 2011-12, 31% of all Latinos receiving Pell Grants also received an institutional grant, compared to 37% of Asian/Pacific Islanders, 23% of Whites, 20% of American Indians, and 15% of African Americans.¹⁰

Latino Pell Grant Recipients by Sector

• Latinos enrolled at community colleges were less likely to receive Pell Grants than Latinos enrolled in other institutions. In 2011-12, 41% of Latinos enrolled at community colleges received a Pell Grant, compared to 72% enrolled at for-profit institutions, 53% enrolled at 4-year private nonprofit institutions, and 52% enrolled at 4-year public institutions.¹¹
